Ancestry has unparalleled coverage of census, vital, church, court and migration records for Canada, United States, UK and numerous other countries around the world. It has 4 billion records, 11 million member trees, one billion names uploaded to those trees by Ancestry users, 7.4 million unique site visitors, 500 employees worldwide, and 22 million photographs and stories uploaded.

## Speakers

**Lisa Alzo**, MFA is the author of nine books, as well as numerous articles in genealogical magazines and journals. She teaches online genealogy courses and lectures at major conferences.

A passionate family history researcher for more than 35 years, Lesley is the Director of Education running educational seminars for the British Isles Family History Society of Greater Ottawa. Lesley also volunteers at the local Family History Center, consults privately, teaches family history classes and speaks at seminars and conferences.

**Marie Careau** is a social historian and has been working in genealogy for more than 15 years. She gave several lectures on the dynamics of settlements, on the history of the township of Hull and on methodology in genealogical research. She is now working on the first settlements in Hull. She is a member of the board of directors of the Société de généalogie de l'Outaouais (SGO). She is the recipient of Prize Lionel-Groulx in History.

**Doug Hoddinott** is a retired engineer and computer specialist. He has organized research and demonstration rooms and coordinated audio-visual services at several events including the Ottawa Branch Gene-O-Rama and BIFHSGO Fall Conference. He has also given presentations on Family Tree Maker and publishing your family history using genealogical software.

**John D. Reid** is an Ottawa-area family historian with an interest in his British roots and advances in technology. He writes the Anglo-Celtic Connections blog.

**Rick Roberts** co-founded GlobalGenealogy.com Inc. with his wife Sandra in 1992. He publishes history and vital records books under the Global Heritage Press imprint, as well as the online magazine The Global Gazette. Global Print Service was added in 2009, providing printing and binding services for self-published authors.

**Marthe Séguin-Muntz** is a Project Officer employed with the Canadian Genealogy Centre since 2007. She is also a Canadian Studies enthusiast.

**Glenn Wright** is the author of several books, as well as a contributor to the Canadian Encyclopaedia and the Oxford Dictionary of Canadian History. Glenn was a researcher for the popular TV series "Ancestors in the Attic" and appeared on the CBC series "Who Do You Think You Are?" He has over thirty years experience as an archivist retiring in 2006 from Library and Archives Canada. Glenn speaks at genealogical conferences and gave the inaugural Ryan Taylor Memorial Lecture for the Ottawa Branch OGS in 2007.

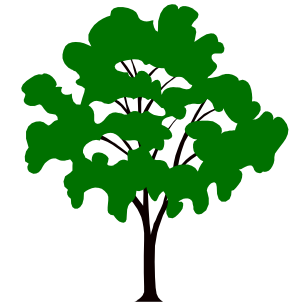

## Library and Archives Canada

Library and Archives Canada (LAC) combines the collections, services and staff expertise of the former National Library of Canada and National Archives of Canada. LAC's objectives are to provide all Canadians with easy, one-stop access to the texts, photographs and other documents that reflect their cultural, social and political development. LAC holds many microfilmed documents relating to Canadian history in the possession of other governments (mainly France and Great Britain) and the papers of individuals who played a significant role in Canadian affairs.

The most frequently used sources for genealogical research are census, church, land, military, estate and immigration records. Family historians often consult the microfilmed Canadian newspapers, as well as city directories, national biographies, transcribed parish registers and published family histories.
